


Y7 Heroes Creative Challenge tasks

"When I played... there used to be players doing things wrong and you made the newspapers if it was a big story. Otherwise it was swept under the carpet. Now players are paid vast sums of money and as a result players are role models. Footballers have to be responsible in the public eye, but what really concerns me is their behaviour on the field."

Are all sports stars good role models?

Role models and behaviour

The conduct of players, officials and spectators has an effect on the image of individual sports and the expectations of behaviour by those involved in them.

In pairs, discuss whether or not you agree with these provocative statements:

- 1. It is not fair to put pressure on sports stars to act as role models.
- 2. Most sports stars behave responsibly.
- 3. Sports stars should be able to do whatever they want off the pitch.

Compare some examples of conduct in sports:

Golf - players are expected to own up to anything that they do wrong and even disqualify themselves.

Football - diving by players to get a free kick or penalty is increasing and almost everyone is complaining about it. But accepting the rewards when cheating benefits *their* team.

Cricket - opposition fans sit and stand together and there is usually a friendly atmosphere. Police presence and stewarding is light. Video surveillance is almost unheard of.

Rugby union - the laws of the game penalise players for arguing with the referee although some acts of violence are dealt with as part of the game. Etiquette requires that the players always clap each other off the field and problems are left on the pitch.

Football - players often surround the referee to argue with decisions.

Consider: Do the fans encourage players to play well or behave badly? Do the players incite the fans to celebrate or abuse each other?

CHALLENGE + How many sports star role models can you list? How many negative sports role models can you list? Why are they examples of bad role models?

What to do:

Step 1: Decide – do you agree or disagree with the statement?


Step 2: Plan your arguments using the planning skeleton. Include examples or worthy or unworthy role models. You may need to do some research.

Step 4: State whether or not you agree with the statement. Include examples of worthy or unworthy role models to support your point of view. Use your planning skeleton to help.


Step 5: End your letter.

- ✓ Vary language use with a range of techniques: tripling, rhetorical question, statistics
- ✓ Arguments are convincing
- ✓ Use a range of details/examples to support your view

Most Challenging

- ✓ Evaluate. Which sports stars make the best role models? Why? Does the media unfairly represent some groups of sports stars?
- ✓ Remember writing at the highest level will be convincing and almost error-free.
